03 Notable Scribes in the Bible

Moses, at God's direction, established the government of Israel. Scribes were part of this newly formed government, as they had the skills and leadership. This government was given authority by God himself.

Ezra, was part of the returning exiled from Babylon. He reestablished scribes and temple activities. He set scribes as teachers, reformers. He was primarily focused on the people's heart motivations and their righteousness to God.

Scribes in Jesus Time

Scribes in Bible Times

Early Scribes were part of the ruling class and served in the Temple. These were descendants of the Levites. Duties of scribes were varied, depending on where they were employed. In the Temple, they recorded the Law, counted and recorded the money recieved and other priestly duties. In service to the Kings, they wrote and recorded edicts and history, served as advisors, and conducted business.

Scribes in Jesus Time


Scribes in Jesus time were associated with several religious sects: Pharisees and Sadducees. They were religious as well as political in their authority. Simply, they were supposed to lead the Jewish people with their knowledge of the Torah and govern according to their laws and traditions. Most, but not all, were known as hypocrites, but Jesus identified some scribes who were not hypocrites. Jesus criticized their actions and heart motives.

Scribes and Holy Spirit

Scribes in the Early Church

Prophetic gifts were activated on Pentecost. Prior to this any scribal activity was the work of Holy Spirit, but poured out for a specific time on a specific person. Holy Spirit now is available to everyone! Scribes are carriers of the Holy Spirit, and are purposed to preach, teach, interpret God's will and purpose for His people.

Purpose of Prophetic Writing

- 1.To write a memorial unto God to be rehearsed and memorized for eternity. Exodus 17:14-15
- 2.To record legally binding agreements and contracts between God and man, God and Jesus, and man and man. Exodus 34:27
- 3.To record genealogy or lineage. Psalm 87:5-7
- 4.To serve as witness, evidence or proof of a thing relating to God or for a historical account. Deuteronomy 31:19
- 5.To inspire or encourage others in the things of God. 1 John 1:4
- 6.To clarify instructions concerning vision, direction, order or plans revealed by God. Habakkuk 2:2
7. To warn people of pending judgement. 1 Corinthians 4:14
- 8.To record the things you have seen, experienced, and the things the Lord has shown you. Revelation 1:19
- 9.To record the things God reveals to your heart in a book. Jeremiah 30:2
- 10.To give an orderly account of things that happened and to record the exact words of God. Luke 1:3

Distinctive Signs of the Prophetic Scribe

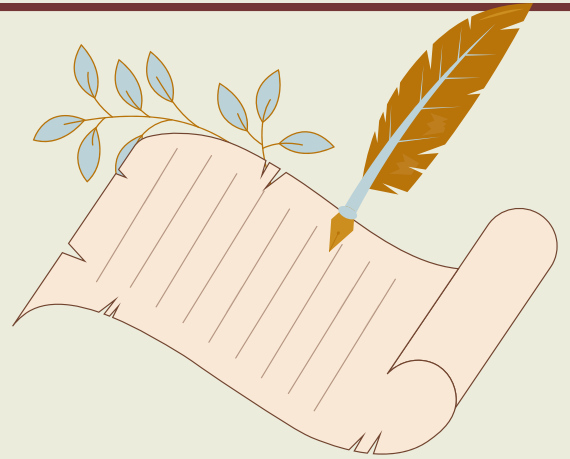


1. Often pray, intercede or talk with God through their pen.
2. Write or record from a strong, unplanned or unrehearsed flow.
3. Can quickly identify God's heart concerning the direction of creative, administrative or instructional literary works.
4. Once awakened by the Lord, they experience constant manifestations of their gifting.
5. Long and desire to hear the Lord speak to them and through them either creatively, instructionally or administratively.
6. Have a preoccupation with recording what they see, hear, and/or experience from the Lord.
7. May have a special gift and anointing to hear and see stories, articles, novels and books in the lives of others or on behalf of others.
8. Experience an urgent call to record everything the Lord releases to them and cannot rest until those things are completed.

- to execute with excellence in their prophetic assignment and ministry to the Body of Christ.


We identify, teach and train those who come to us and want to minister in their scribal gift.
